Maria Jauregui Ponte and Marc Volk's joint exhibition „Was sonst noch geschah“ (What else happened) was created through an associative play with photographic images they selected from the depths of their extensive archives in August 2020. Proceeding intuitively, they allowed the project's themes and forms to evolve over time and through interaction. Ponte and Volk are interested in images which, for various reasons, touch us immediately. Their exhibition „Was sonst noch geschah“ gives these finds from the past a new context, and in so doing opens up a space for spontaneous associations, contradictory feelings, and untold stories.

**Maria Jauregui Ponte** (\*1972 in Hondarribia, Spain) is fascinated by the medium of photography as a field of experimentation and seeks images that, in their independence, radiate mystery and deal with colour, space, light, and inner worlds. In recent years, nature has become an ever-present theme. The tension between chance and control is often part of her playful approach. Jauregui Ponte studied at the Neue Schule für Fotografie Berlin. Represented by Galerie Springer Berlin since 2018, she lives and works in Berlin.


In his artistic work **Marc Volk** (\*1967 in Stuttgart) circles around philosophical, social, and aesthetic questions. For him, photography is both a medium for gaining knowledge and an individual means of expression; while examining the visible, he communicates inner states. Volk is always on the lookout for improbable images: he considers a work successful when it captivates our senses. Volk studied communication design at Folkwang University of the Arts as well as at the Rietveld Academie in Amsterdam. He founded the International Photography School Berlin in 2020.

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




